# **JUST-FOR-KIDS TOUR**

- 1. The Desert Garden is full of plants that look like they're from another planet. Some are round, some are tall, some are big, and some are small. But beware: Some of these plant varieties have spikes, so it's best to keep your hands to yourself!
- Follow the hill down to the Lily Ponds. Peer into the water and you just might see turtles and fish. Turtles sometimes come out of the water to feel the warmth of the sun. But if you see one, try not to get too close!
- 3. Part of the Australian Lawn goes up, down, and around in a unique pattern. Run along this hilly area. How do you think these weird bumps formed?
- 4. Race up to the Rose Garden, and stay on the outer walkways lined with trees and vines. At the bottom of one of these trees is a teeny tiny door that is home to Ms. Pixie the Elf. No one knows what kinds of magical things she does all day, but she loves hearing all the visitors pass by.
- 5. Have you ever brushed your teeth with minty toothpaste? Or enjoyed a delicious pizza? Then you've encountered some of the herbs in our Herb Garden. This garden is made up of stuff people can eat. As you visit this garden, don't pick anything, but you can touch and smell. Sometimes there are Huntington volunteers here who will share a little piece of the garden with you.
- 6. Free Floating Clouds, a gigantic painting in the Virginia Steele Scott Galleries of American Art, almost takes up an entire wall! Splotches of blue, purple, and green create a cloudy sky. Take a seat on the bench, and pick your favorite part of the painting. What kinds of shapes do you see?
- 7. Use the big, grassy lawn in the North Vista as your stage! All these old statues are your audience—but please don't touch them! You can dance, sing, run around, and put on a show. Or maybe you'll pose like your favorite statue. The curtain's going up ... you're on!
- 8. End your journey in the **Children's Garden**. Go through the kid-sized blue door, and follow the leaf prints to the Sonic Pool. Watch the water dance. Close your eyes. What does the water sound like? Next, find the Pebble Chimes and make up your own song to the music of small stones.
