Learning at Home

Slowing Down: The Artist's Pace

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In this resource, we will consider the ideas of Huntington artist-in-residence Enrique Martínez Celaya, respond to different artworks, and reflect on our own artwork.

Supplies: Handouts (provided), pen or pencil, art supplies

What to do:

- Choose one of the following artworks from The Huntington Art Museum catalog:
 - a. Pink Lightning, Black Mountain
 - b. Isleta Pottery Maker, Pueblo of Isleta, New Mexico
 - c. <u>Breakfast in Bed</u>
- 2. Complete Handout A.

Show and Share:

- 1. Before creating your art, complete <u>Handout B</u> to help you envision what you want to create.
- 2. Using <u>Handout B</u> as a reference, begin working on your artwork. Remember, you can change your mind as you go!
- 3. Once you have completed your artwork, write an artist's reflection using Handout C.

Extend your Learning:

- See how an artwork can change over time. Compare <u>Top Man [study]</u> with the completed <u>Top Man</u> painting. How are they different? What did the artist add between the study and the painting?
- 2. <u>View the art Martínez Celaya has shown at The Huntington and read about his work.</u>
- 3. Create a second artwork using the same planning sheet (<u>Handout B</u>). Be sure not to look at your first artwork while creating your second! When you are done, compare your two artworks. How are they different? How are they similar?
- 4. Walk around your home and find a good place to hang your artwork. Where did you pick? Why do you think this is a good place for this artwork?
